The night undoubtedly created many memories for those in attendance and officially kicked off the holiday season in downtown Wooster.

Nov. Safety Council Recap: Mental Wellness and Holistic Healing

During the November meeting, Brooke Winkler, of Engaging the Spirit, spoke to the Safety Council group about Mental Wellness and Holistic Healing. She shared some of her traumas and



struggles and the ways she has found to cope with them. She is a registered yoga teacher and Laugh-A-Yoga teacher. She is also an MARI Practitioner and a heartcentered hypnotherapist.

Brooke has searched for alternative treatment options. Art therapy is one thing she has found to be helpful for herself and others. Each of the Safety Council attendees was given an opportunity to participate in an art therapy activity during the meeting. They were asked to choose a piece of clay as they entered the meeting. Then they had to think of an animal that best fits their personality and then sculpt that animal out of the clay. Everyone was then told to sculpt a corresponding item for each person's animal at their table. So an item for a dog could be a leash or a blanket. These items were meant to represent ways to restrain your most notable characteristics. For the dog, the leash could represent control or assistance depending on the person's perspective. This exercise provided a great opportunity for the Safety Council members to interact with the people at their table.
